ANNUAL BAR WARS FUNDRAISER FOR CHN WILL BE JULY 22ND

Bar Wars is a high-energy mixology contest where Denver's top LGBTQ+ bars/bartenders compete over three rounds to see who will emerge victorious for their style, flair, and flavor while raising money for CHN. Each round, patrons can taste beverages from each bar and vote for their favorites with cash or Venmo donations at each bar station.

In addition to being a whole lot of fun, Bar Wars is an important source of funding for Coloradans impacted by HIV. Funds raised through Bar Wars will benefit vital HIV support programs such as healthcare, nutrition, housing, and more.

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PUEBLO PREVENTION/ACCESS POINT PUEBLO

Pueblo Prevention has begun providing walk-in HIV/Hepatitis C/Syphilis/Chlamydia/Gonorrhea testing on site.

Our syringe access program had more than 1200 visits in June. The prevention team received a limited amount of test strips for Xylazine, a newer concerning drug cut that is causing a lot of harm. This drug is a veterinary sedative that can cause overdose that will not be reversed with naloxone and has been shown to be difficult to treat. We are holding conversations with participants about Xylazine to promote awareness and education.

Coordinators presented on our services at the Consumer Advisory Council's (CAC) lunch-&-learn, STI Prevention 101 to the Pueblo cohort of the Youth #unfiltered Sexpert School, and hosted a table with Sexperts at Rawlings Library. Staff are also collaboratively organizing a large-scale resource fair in Bessemer Park, Pueblo, on August 9 with a goal of improving awareness of STI Prevention services in Pueblo.

Finally, Prevention staff continue to offer syringe Community Cleanups as well as organizing staff to do smaller cleanups from time to time. Prevention looks forward to the new CHAPP year, starting July 1, and the many future opportunities to consider and strategize for as more local funding through Opioid settlement funds continue to be established.

PUEBLO HEALTH HUB UPDATE

Pueblo's Health Hub program has picked up speed in the last few months with over 30 referrals in June! Many folx are visiting our wound care clinic on Tuesday afternoons, facilitated by Southern Colorado Family Medicine (SCFM) residents. This wound care clinic has led to higher engagement from our clients over the past few months, with individuals now seeking care with SCFM for higher level medical needs. This past month, we started to see traction with individuals requesting support for substance use disorder treatment.

Health Hub staff completed a needs assessment with 25 program participants regarding healthcare utilization, barriers to care, and current health status. Transportation, finances, stable housing, provider stigma, and mental health are the major barriers to engaging in any type of medical care. We learned 4 out of the 25 individuals had been tested for HIV/HCV in the past year. 13 of the 25 have engaged in behavioral health support. 10 of the 25 have engaged in some level of medication-assisted treatment. Survey respondents also indicated they would be interested in accessing medication assisted treatment on-site at Access Point Pueblo. When we asked what medical services folx utilize when they have concerns, we learned emergency department utilization as primary medical services is over 50%.

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JULY 21ST IS ZERO HIV STIGMA AWARENESS DAY

Last year, July 21st was chosen as global Zero HIV Stigma Awareness Day to honor and commemorate the birthday of late South African AIDS activist Prudence Mabele, the first black South African woman to publicly share her HIV status.

A consortium of four community, medical, and urban health organizations created this new international awareness day in 2022 with the intent of calling attention to the persistent levels of stigma experienced by people living with and affected by HIV.



HIV stigma is a social justice issue and everyone has a part to play in eliminating HIV stigma—be it talking about it, challenging biases, testing for HIV, or advocacy—if societal attitudes to HIV are to be transformed. Find out more at www.zerohivstigmaday.org.

Thanks to Opioid Settlement Funding, we will soon be launching mobile outreach services! The intent is to provide multi-agency outreach. The team has started to do outreach at some of the camps in Pueblo and are learning needs in different areas.

As an aside, 4 prevention staff attended Sonic Bloom, an annual music festival in Rye, CO. Staff passed out Narcan, Fentanyl Test Strips, provided education, and even participated in some trip-sitting. It was a great experience for all involved.

Finally, we have had some very positive conversations with community partners in the Southeastern Counties, particularly in Otero, Baca, and Prowers counties. Harm Reduction is still tenuous, but we have provided more education around harm reduction's role in the spectrum of recovery. There are strong advocates who want to officially partner to support community engagement, expansion harm reduction, and support health hub resources.
