Dear clients, friends and supporters:

During the early days of the AIDS pandemic forty years ago, most of the world's leaders would not even talk about it. They responded with shock, then denial, downplaying and delayed responses. The world's populations were fearful and the lack of information and trust caused the disruption of everyday life and ultimately led to the deaths of many people. Sound familiar? Dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic has been eerily similar to the early months and years of the AIDS pandemic, despite the many differences in the viruses that cause AIDS and COVID-19. We're proud that the staff and clients of Colorado Health Network (CHN) have been resilient over this past year. It's because of their strength and perseverance thirty years ago and today that we remain strong as an organization.

Throughout the time we've been responding to the ups and downs of COVID-19, we have continued to support folx living with HIV and have continued our work to help prevent the spread of HIV and other health conditions. Most of our service delivery was impacted by COVID-19 resulting in major shifts in how programs and services were delivered to meet clients' needs. From screening

visitors as they entered our offices to wearing masks just about everything we do was impacted. In our food banks we moved to providing pre-packaged foods and in case management and health access, we began providing virtual meetings with clients. We also moved food bank and syringe access program services to brief contact visits close to our office entries to protect clients by minimizing potential exposure. We also began providing most behavior health sessions virtually. Most of our medical and dental clinic visits were limited to urgent appointments only. As of today, we have moved back to regular operations for most services, but we continue to wear masks and

encourage distancing, where possible.

Throughout this annual report, you'll find information about the programs and supportive services CHN continues to provide to bring health and stability to clients' and patients' lives including linking them to, or retaining them in care and assisting them with supportive services. You'll also find information about CHN's clinical, housing and prevention services.

We couldn't continue to do this important work without you! Thank you for your ongoing support as we bring healthier lives to persons with HIV and reduce the spread of HIV and other health conditions across Colorado and beyond.





Our Service to Colorado



OUR PROGRAMS

CHN operates its prevention and sexual health services via HeyDenver and Hey719 in Colorado Springs. The Howard Dental Center provides oral health care services in Denver, Fort Collins and Colorado Springs. AccessPoint provides syringe access programs in Grand Junction, Pueblo, Denver and Colorado Springs









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Our foodbanks across Colorado provide nutritional support for people living with HIV. In 2020-21, our foodbanks were visted 2,952 times by 844 care clients. In total, 39,923 meals were provided. Additionally, some locations secured funding to provide nutritional support / food pantry services to prevention clients accessing testing and our syringe access programs.

Across Colorado, CHN served
5,452 people living with HIV.
Among these, 4,533 clients
received case management and
visited CHN offices/staff more than
39,000 times to engage in care.
Altogether, our teams provided
8,299 contact hours to ensure
clients had access to medical care,
emergency financial assistance
when needed, and access to critical
insurance services to provide for
life-saving medication.

Housing services keeps single father with young children housed after the loss of their mother

"Ray" and his wife "Elena" were diagnosed with HIV in California in 2005. They had two children together — a son in 2005 and a daughter in 2007. They relocated to Western Colorado and became clients of WCHN in 2017.

Although they eventually divorced, they remained engaged in each others lives. They provided support for each others treatment and management of HIV. Elena retained custody of their children and Ray was actively involved in raising them.

In late 2019, Elena was diagnosed with cancer and unfortunately succumbed to the cancer in December 2020. At the time of her passing, Ray did not have stable housing and was unprepared to take care of his two children. Fortunately, Ray was pulled for a

Tenant-Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) voucher five days after her passing. Although he did not have stable housing for them, the prospect of enrolling in the TBRA program gave him much needed

hope. Ray received housing assistance from his case manager in the form of a motel stay while he looked for a property that would meet his needs while still adhering to the requirements of the

TBRA program.

WCHN housing staff collaborated with the client to facilitate his property search and navigate the enrollment process. Less than four weeks from receiving the voucher, Ray was leased up and moving into a property that provided the safety and stability he so desperately needed.







Trauma-informed care leads to new, huge, healthy smile for dental care client

"Ruby" presented for her first exam in our Colorado Springs regional dental office in June 2021 with the chief complaint, "I have a permanent bridge that isn't permanent anymore. It comes out easily and I am worried I am going around dental appointments because she had past trauma. She wanted to make sure she was seeing female team members – Dr. Amy Rosinsky and Vanessa Saenz.

After examining her, it was

we asked if she wanted to be referred to an oral surgeon, but she mentioned that she preferred to stay with us because we made her so comfortable. After removing the affected teeth, the infection continued to drain and this required some medical management which was achieved through direct communication with her doctor until the issue was resolved.

We were able to repair the savable teeth while waiting for her mouth to heal. As we progressed through her fillings and even crowns, she got more and more comfortable with us every time. Her treatment









to choke on it. I haven't been to the dentist for about 5 years or more."

She had initially called ahead of the appointment and spoke with our team about her nervousness determined that most of her teeth could not be saved and removable prosthetics were planned along with extractions and crowns.

Ruby had significant infection in her mouth and initially





was made possible through funding support to help cover her costs as she did not have any dental insurance.

She reliably and cheerfully came to every appointment and we progressed through her treatment plan until her healing was complete and we were able to deliver her new dentures the first week of January 2022. She was so looking forward to that day but was also reserved in her expectations. She could not stop smiling after receiving her new teeth. She told us that she was grateful for our care and patience as we moved through appointments and her final statement to us at the end of the day was

"I feel so much healthier. When your mouth is healthy, you just feel better. I was so fearful that something bad was going to happen and now I know nothing is going to go wrong."

She knows that even if something does come up, she has a dental home she can count on.

Prevention and health education teams provide low-barrier, sex-positive, shame-free sexual health services

We believe our clients are the best qualified persons to make decisions about their health. In addition to providing testing services, our team is equipped to help Coloradans access any information, resources, and referrals that might be relevant to their sexual health. Our prevention staff help people brainstorm behavior changes, provide education about HIV and STI transmission and treatment options, and always strive to reduce community stigma and anxiety around HIV and STIs through education and affirming care. Our services are provided completely free of charge and are available to anyone.





In addition to in-office services, teams across Colorado conduct outreach, providing educational information regarding HIV, Hepatitis C, STIs, and safer-sex supplies, and information on healthy relationships / sexual health.

Harm reduction programs reduce spread of HIV, Hepatitis C, and prevent more than 1,000 overdoses

AccessPoint Colorado — our confidential and anonymous syringe access program — is central to CHN's harm reduction and HIV prevention efforts.

Serving nearly 6,000 individuals, the program provides unused, sterile syringes and injection equipment at no cost to

individuals who inject substances.

Highly effective at reducing the spread of HIV, Hepatitis C and other infections, our syringe access program is also a critical component to Colorado's fight to address the overdose epidemic.

Beyond supplying equipment, program staff council participants

in safer use, overdose prevention and provide connection to community resources including recovery options.

Additionally, program participants are equipped with and trained on the use of fentanyl test strips and life-saving naloxone (more commonly known by the brand name Narcan®) that can reverse an opiod overdose.





Since returning to sit down syringe access program sessions, prevention staff have been better serving our community by creating a space where they can connect on a more meaningful level with participants.

Recently, a participant wanted to talk about telling his dad about his use. The participant was worried about overdosing and wanted to teach his dad how to administer Narcan, and also feared getting into an argument after disclosing his use. Staff actively listened and helped brainstorm ways to talk to his dad about his use, when he was ready to.

In the meantime, staff and the participant created a safety plan. Staff gave the participant the number for "Never Use Alone," a hotline that helps people receive emergency care if overdosing alone, and the participant called a close friend to see if he could stay with them for a couple days if him and his dad argued. The participant was offered counseling and was excited to have an intake with one of our inhouse counselors.

Before leaving, the participant thanked staff for giving him a judgement-free and supportive space to talk about what he was going through.




