As a community, we want to center "person-centered language" by avoiding stigmatizing language that emphasizes decline or suffering and ultimately, value people's individuality and personal connection to language more that strict language rules. We want to center a person's choice to identify and uphold that in communication. Below are some helpful contexts to guide our language today.

ELDERLY VS ELDER

Elderly emphasizes ageist stereotypes of decline and frailty, while elder typically refers to wisdom, virtue and experience that comes with age. Especially among many communities of color and LGBTQ+ people, elder is used to both signify respect and amplifies resilience despite living through histories of discrimination.

HIV/AIDS

AIDS is a diagnosis that occurs when the immune system is weakened by the HIV virus, it can't be transmitted. Thus, the sector starting using HIV, which though technically correct, diminished those who continue to live with an AIDS diagnosis - a unique experience of resilience and historical stigma. HIV/AIDS can be inclusive of both.




EPIDEMIOLOGY CLINICAL RESEARCH ASSOCIATE

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Patrick Roberts is an enrolled member of the Hopi Nation, Sun Forehead Clan, Sipaulovi Village, Second Mesa, AZ, and currently serves as a Clinical Research Associate at Vitalant Research Institute (VRI) in San Francisco. He supports research on transfusion medicine, donor and recipient epidemiology, and blood safety policy. Patrick began his research career at Genentech, Inc., and now plays a key role in VRI's research operations, including participant engagement, protocol compliance, and research administration. He serves on VRI's Institutional Biosafety Committee and supports post-award efforts. Patrick was a contributor to the landmark ADVANCE Study, which helped inform the FDA's decision to remove the blood donation deferral for MSM. The study was conducted with UCSF CAPS, the FDA, LGBTQ+ centers, and national blood banks. He continues to support qualitative research focused on blood donor motivation and infectious disease risk reduction to help shape equitable public health policies.

Phil Nash made Denver his home in 1976, launching a career in LGBTQ activism, journalism, and nonprofit leadership. He was a founding member and the first staffer of the Gay Community Center of Colorado (now The Center on Colfax) and later served as editor of Out Front, Colorado's leading LGBTQ publication in the early 1980s. Nash also contributed to The Advocate, Westword, and other outlets. He helped found and served as the first board chair of the Colorado AIDS Project. Over the years, he held senior communications roles in civic and philanthropic organizations, including advising Denver Mayor Federico Peña. His book LGBTQ Denver chronicles over five decades of local LGBTQ history—much of which he witnessed, reported, and photographed.

Dr. Alison Abraham, PhD, MHS, MS is a Professor and Vice Chair of Education in the Department of Epidemiology at the Colorado School of Public Health, with a secondary appointment in Ophthalmology at the University of Colorado School of Medicine. She holds an MS in Biomedical Engineering from California State University, Sacramento; an MHS in Biostatistics; and a PhD in Epidemiology from Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. Dr. Abraham has over 15 years of experience leading large, multi-site observational cohort studies, with a focus on chronic kidney disease, HIV, cognitive health, substance use, and sensory loss. Her current research centers on aging and sensory health, particularly how hearing and vision loss impact healthy aging and quality of life. She is a passionate advocate for building resiliency, supporting aging in place, and centering health outcomes that matter most to individuals. She is the Principal Investigator of several large studies on eye disease and sensory loss in older adults, with a particular emphasis on people aging with HIV. Dr. Abraham also collaborates with CHN to integrate geriatric care models into HIV services, including onsite vision and hearing screenings and improved access to assistive devices.



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Dr. Jacob Walker, MD is an assistant professor in the Division of Geriatrics at the University of Colorado. Dr. Walker has a unique background in both geriatric care and HIV medicine and practices both disciplines across multiple clinical settings. Originally from Indiana, he is a graduate of Boston University School of Medicine and completed his Internal Medicine-Primary Care residency at the University of Colorado. He then returned to the Midwest for geriatrics fellowship at the University of Chicago where he stayed on as an assistant professor. Returning to Colorado in 2022, Dr. Walker now practices at the University of Colorado where he leads the Positive Aging Clinic, one of only a few geriatric HIV clinics in the country. Other areas of clinical interest include dementia, polypharmacy, and frailty. Dr. Walker's primary research focus is the integration of geriatric care principles into the care of older adults living with HIV, especially focused on dementia care.

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





CALVIN LAVAN GIPSON

Calvin Lavan Gipson is a Denver native, and is a 34-year conqueror of HIV/AIDS having lived through the epidemic in San Francisco from 1985 - 2007. Calvin was the executive assistant to civil rights leader, Rev. Cecil Williams at Glide Memorial Church in San Francisco. At Glide, Calvin directed a Daily Free Meals Program that served over six million free meals to the hungry. The program inspired the Oscar nominated film, "The Pursuit of Happyness" starring Will Smith. Calvin is the second Black American to serve as president of the San Francisco Lesbian Gay Bisexual Transgender Pride Parade and Celebration. He is a past-president of Frameline - The San Francisco LGBTQ+ International Film Festival. Calvin directed the Brothas4Ever program at It Takes A Village, is on the Denver Metro HIV Planning Council and serves on the festival committee for GALA Choruses hosting music festivals with 7,000 queer singers. Calvin works on the guest relations team of the Denver Broncos and was recently awarded "Rookie of the Year".
